
2020 Gala and Silent Auction

There are a great many things going on at the St. John Bosco Center, and many changes that are being planned for the future. As the numbers of students we serve continues to grow, our physical needs are also growing. When Fr. Vaccaro first started as chaplain here, about 35 students regularly were involved and attending Sunday Mass. **In a few short years that number has more than doubled.**

We have purchased the properties on either side of the center to expand parking and to provide a residence for the chaplain and meeting space for bible studies and other small groups, now we need to focus on:

- renovation of the property that will house the chaplain and meeting space.
- furniture for the chaplain’s apartment as well as the meeting spaces in the new building.
- providing for a portion of our budget (\$20,000) that the diocese has asked us to provide.

Introducing Maria DeLuca, Associate Campus Minister

I am originally from New Jersey and I grew up in close proximity to New York City. It is in this area that I first became acquainted with my faith although truly seeking the Lord didn't happen until years later. I went to a private Catholic high school followed by college at Seton Hall University. At first, these schools served as springboards for my athletic ambition, however, it is at Seton Hall that I found my faith in a real and deep way. Before I share what is happening here at the St. John Bosco Center, I would like to share how I came here! Originally from Elida, Ohio, I graduated from Bowling Green State University in 2011. Over the next two years, I served in campus ministry at St. Thomas More University Parish and Newman Center in Bowling Green, Ohio, while also working as a broadcaster of high school sports both for Holy Family Radio and for the West Ohio Sports Network, both in northwest Ohio.

In 2013, I began formation for religious life and priesthood with the Redemptorists, founded by one of my favorite saints, St. Alphonsus Liguori. St. Alphonsus has a radical love of the Lord Jesus, as well as great zeal for the mission of preaching the Gospel to the poor and most abandoned, that is, souls most in need of encountering the love of Christ. However, even though I have this devotion to St. Alphonsus, after roughly six years of formation, the last three of which I lived in temporary vows of poverty, chastity and obedience, the Redemptorists and I discerned that God was calling me to serve Him and His Church elsewhere.

Since June 2019, I have had the great blessing to serve the Lord and His Church as Associate Campus Minister here at the University of Mary Washington (UMW) on behalf of the Diocese of Arlington. Over this first half-year of serving as Campus Minister, I have enjoyed my time here as well as my laboring for the glory of God and the salvation of souls. What more important work is there? The one thing necessary is to bring souls to Christ so that He may transform their lives and call them to be saints, the same call He has for you and I.

There are two highlights I would like to share with you. The first one is that on September 5, 2019, we held our annual procession with the Blessed Sacrament, the Holy Eucharist, on the UMW campus and followed with All-Night Adoration which went for close to 12 hours until the next morning, Sept. 6. I hear stories of how this great act of faith and worship of the Lord has brought about blessings, and even conversions, in the lives of college students.

The second highlight is our Freshmen retreat which took place at the end of September. With the assistance of some of the student leaders, I organized this retreat for incoming freshmen students at UMW and Germanna Community College. The freshmen students spent Friday evening and most of Saturday on retreat, which consisted of Mass and Confession, Eucharistic Adoration, talks on prayer and living as a Catholic in college, and time to develop and grow friendships with their peers.

Finally, I ask for your support of our mission as the Catholic Campus Ministry at UMW. Our mission is to call young adults to deepen their faith in Christ during their college years to prepare for living as a His missionary disciple after college. Please pray that we remain faithful to this mission and I am grateful for your support of time, talent, and treasure.

The Eucharist at UMW

One can argue that there are many that know God, but how many people truly *know God*. *Maybe, a fairer way of stating this would be, "One can argue that there are many that know God intellectually, but how many people truly know God as a person?"*

If people truly *knew God*, our churches would be bursting at the seams and we would have vibrant parishes that are reaching out to those in their communities articulating to them the amazing Love and Freedom that comes from living the Gospel. This, sadly, is not the case with only about one-third of Catholics believing in the True Presence.

This idea of *knowing God* is the call of a disciple. It is one thing to have knowledge of God intellectually, but another to have the conviction within our heart that manifests in concretely willing to following Him as His disciple. This ultimately is what he wants from us; to will every day to love Him.

One of the biggest pieces of advice that was given to me is to "stay close to Christ in the Eucharist". The famous phrase is that the Eucharist is the "Source and Summit" of our Faith; everything comes from and leads back to the Eucharist. Thus, a solid integration into the Sacramental life is a huge step in one coming to *know Christ and be His disciple*.

The Saint John Bosco Center here at the University of Mary Washington makes this integration into the Sacramental life very easy. With the opportunity to receive Christ at Mass six days a week, the opportunity to spend time with Him face-to-face in Adoration over five hours a week, and the chapel doors open nearly 24/7; it is

difficult to say, "He wasn't available". What a great blessing we have here!

I pray that this deliberate way of becoming integrated into the Sacramental life here at the Saint John Bosco Center bears fruit in graduates becoming parishioners that are so in love with Christ, that others follow their lead.
